We are partnering with Interfaith Worker Justice and the Restaurant Opportunities Center (ROC) United to support the Fair Minimum Wage Act of 2013, which would make the following vital advances:

Raise the minimum wage to \$10.10 per hour by 2015

Index the minimum wage to inflation

Anchor the minimum wage for tipped employees-currently an abominable \$2.13 an hour-to 70 percent of the regular minimum wage

Three and a half million people of color would be lifted out of poverty if Congress raised the minimum wage to \$10.10. They would be the majority of the six million people overall who would be lifted out of poverty, according to a new report from the restaurant workers' group ROC United.
